

Action by people locally to create economic opportunities and enhance the social and environmental conditions of their communities, particularly those most marginalised, on a sustainable and inclusive basis






Strengthening Canada's Communities


What are some of the results of CED?

To join with others to take action on growing social and economic inequality across Canada






