“Honouring the Aboriginal Path of Well-being”




Mission:

Community Learning Series Core Objectives of 2006 – 2007

Goal:

To create sustainable capacity within First Nations and Métis communities to respond to their colorectal cancer health care and educational needs.

Objectives:

- To increase the communities' knowledge and understanding of the current cancer system
- To build internal capacity for the communities to respond to their cancer care needs
- To provide training to First Nation and Métis health care providers that encompass prevention, promotion, treatment, awareness and education components



Community Learning Series

Program Outcomes:

- The community members will have an enhanced understanding of the current cancer system as it pertains to colorectal cancer
- To provide capacity for First Nation and Métis health workers to sustain ongoing educational training to their community members as it pertains to colorectal cancer
- To provide health workers tools and resources to facilitate knowledge transfer to community members



Community Learning Series **Building Capacity**

- communities will have a better understanding of the Ontario cancer system as it pertains to colorectal cancer
- the Aboriginal health care providers are able to competently deliver the colorectal learning series to their community members
- ACCU will provide them with the necessary tools to educate their community members
- The communities will be provided the necessary training and tools in order to implement the education series to their community members



Potential Topics to be Included in the Learning Series

- What is colorectal cancer?
- Outline the symptoms of colorectal cancer
- How to talk to your doctor
- Prevention Strategies
- Screening Modalities
- Treatment Options
- Resources and support for families members
- Outlining Aboriginal specific statistics on cancer



Potential Topics to be Included in the Learning Series — cont'd

- Pain management (Alternative Healing)
- Non-insured health benefits
- Discharge planning
- After-care and follow-up
- Types of Health Care providers in the cancer system (oncologists, social workers, surgeons, dieticians etc.)



Community Learning Series Proposed Implementation

- This learning series will be structured according to a train the educator format
- Designed and presented in PowerPoint format
 - Ensure appropriateness to local needs
 - Saved presentation in a memory stick will be left with participants as an adaptable resource
- It will include exercises and small group interaction
- Will be delivered by ACCU's Health Promotion team
- Training to be provided in 2 sessions so that trainees are not overwhelmed with the information received, allows time to process the information and initiate community implementation




Community Learning Series Knowledge Transfer

- Target Audience for Training:
 - ACCU will work with front line workers
 - The workers will be responsible for disseminating the information to their clients
 - We are forecasting to have approximately 2 to 4 days of training available
 - ACCU will work with front line staff to ensure there is comfort with the information presented
