Smoke Impacts Public Health Concerns

- Forest Fire Smoke includes:
 - Air Toxins
 - Ali Toxili – Irritants
 - Small Particles
- Made up of:
 - Small Particles
 - Water Vapour
 - Gases
- Effects on Human Health:
 - Aggravate Existing Diseases
 Heart and Respiratory
 - Increased Chance of Infection

Smoke Impacts Exposure to Forest Fire Smoke

- Inhaling Smoke is Bad for You
 - Avoid Breathing Smoke if You Can
- Most Susceptible to Exposure:
 - Very Young Children
 - Elderly
 - Individuals With
 - · Chronic Lung Disease
 - · Coronary Heart Disease

Smoke Impacts Visibility

- · Stay Indoors
- Keep Doors and Windows Closed
- Avoid Indoor Burning (wood stoves, candles)
- · Take Your Medications

Smoke Impacts Problem and Nuisance Smoke

- Restricted Activity Days
- · Lost Wages
- Flight Delays/Cancellations
- Odours
- Ash Fallout
- · Safety Related Episodes
- · Shut-in



 - Variances in Forest Fire Smoke (what's Burning)


Smoke Attributes Fire's Role on the Landscape

- · Creates Natural Habitats
- · Renews Forests
- · Provides Diversity
- Hazard Reduction

Smoke Attributes Smoke Dispersion

- · Cannot be Controlled
- Considered in Prescribed Burning and Burnout Activities

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Smoke Attributes Influences on Smoke Dispersion

Weather Influences and Lingering Smoke

- · Unstable Atmosphere
- Winds gusty/turbulent
- Rising Convection Column
- Dissipate faster

Smoke Attributes Influences on Smoke Dispersion

Stable Atmosphere

- Winds remain steady
- Smoke and haze will lay down
- Linger, limited dispersal

Smoke Attributes Influences on Smoke Dispersion

Variances in Forest Fire Smoke (what's Burning)

Smoke Producer's

- · Large Fuels
- Less Intense Fires
- · Low Moisture Content

 - Number of Initial Attacks = 41
 - Second Crew Dispatches = 13
- Number of Fires in Northern Communities = 59

District Emergency Response Teams (ERT)

Legislated Responsibilities

- Forest Fires
- Floods
- Dam Failures
- · Drought / Low Water
- Crude Oil & Natural Gas Exploration and Production
- Erosion
- Soil & Bedrock Instability

District Emergency Response Teams (ERT) **Declaration of Emergency**

- Who Makes the Declaration?
 - The Chief and Council of your Community
- Why is the Call Made?
 - Chief and Council acting on concerns from **Community Members**
 - Smoke impacts
 - Threat From Wildfire

District Emergency Response Teams (ERT) **District Emergency Procedures**

- · Who Goes First/Second/Third
 - Evacuation Phases
- · Partial Evacuation; young children, elderly heart or respiratory problems.
- · Medical problems/disabilities
- Everybody else (if warranted)
- · Check with neighbours, friends or family members for transport.

District Emergency Response Teams (ERT) Arrangements - What to Bring

- Shut off water and hydro (if possible)
- Secure your home Identification
- Blanket
- Warm clothing, footwear, raincoat
- Flashlight
- Luggage Matches, lighter
- Sundries
- Kleenex
- Book, magazine Children articles
- Prescription drugs

District Emergency Response Teams (ERT) Host/Reception Centres

- · Advise during evacuation of any medical needs or disabilities that limit you from movement
- · Also needs required at the host/reception centre

· The decision to evacuate is yours

- Experience health problems seek medical attention
- For further information concerning the health effects of smoke from forest fires, please contact your local health unit.
